

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Jaguar Enthusiasts Car Show & Craft Fair, Rickinghall

Sunday 19th May, The Village Hall, Hinderclay Road, Rickinghall IP22 1HD

This will be the fourth Rickinghall Classic Car Show organised by the Essex and Suffolk Borders JEC; we are attending in support of our neighbours!

Entry is free for display cars, but a small payment of £3 per person (cash only) is required. There will be a licensed bar, food & drink stalls, some trade stands, and crafts in the village hall. Rickinghall itself is a pretty Suffolk village with a very long High Street containing some pubs and bars.

Last year saw more than 1,000 people visiting to see an array of vintage machines. Trophies will be awarded to the winner and two runners up.

An interesting addition this year will be the arrival of a local young man who is in remission from cancer and is raising money for cancer charities. He is driving from Lands End to John O'Groats in a Citroën Picasso bought for a few hundred pounds. Painted pink, it will be called the Pigasso, reflecting his farming employment. He will finish back home at the show - we wish him well.











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Transportfest at the Museum of Power

On Sunday 31st March 2024, members of the JEC Essex Thameside region attended the Transportfest at Langford's Museum of Power site. This was the first show of the season the club has supported. But what a day! Although it was Easter Sunday and a month into the spring season, it was like the middle of winter with the cold winds blowing. We all tried wrapping up, but to no avail. The only warm retreat was the newly extended café at the museum building.



There was an array of specific club stands, plus individual 'classic' motors including this 1934 Singer

11hp Saloon. One of only six known remaining examples of this model, with probably only 3 or 4 roadworthy at present. Quite an innovative car for its time with overhead cam engine of 1394cc, independent front suspension, hydraulic brakes all round and a four-speed gearbox with a fluid flywheel allowing clutchless gear changes on the move.



Purchased in Southport, Lancs, it was kept for only 18 months by its first owner, but then had two lady owners from 1936 into the 1960s. It was then laid up from 1968 till 1995 when she was cosmetically restored by the previous owner. The engine was reconditioned in 1997.

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Where Is Jaguar Going?

For those of you who receive the monthly JEC magazine, you may have read, in the April issue, that JLR is investing in Jaguar and that three new products are maturing for production. We are informed by columnist, Ken McConomy, they are "jaw-dropping" and that engineering is at "full tilt" – well he is Head of Global PR for Jaguar Land Rover. All this is good news for the marque, as long as they don't get cancelled at the eleventh hour, a fate suffered by previous Jaguars not least the latest EV version of the XJ.

As most of us have heard, production of Jaguar's internal-combustion engine vehicles will cease in June this year in preparation for the arrival of three new electric vehicles. This means that the F-Type, XE, XF, E-Pace and F-Pace will be no more in a couple of months. It is thought that the ageing I-Pace





EV will also bite the dust by the end of the year. In order to keep sales going, and to keep customers happy, the company is planning to hold sufficient supplies of its petrol-engine cars to last until the 2025 launch date of the EV line up. Well, good luck with that! The plan to stop car production and keep selling an aged range of old stock until the entirely new and,





as yet unseen, two or three model lines appear, does not seem like a plan for long term survival – more like a package deal for a potential purchaser as Paul Skilleter suggests in the same April issue of Jaguar Enthusiast. Let's hope that JLR keeps and grows Jaguar and it doesn't become a Jaguar badged Chinese import.

For a clean handover and whilst Jaguar's old models are soldiering on, the German trio of Audi, BMW and Mercedes continue to produce both fossil fuelled and electric vehicles, not to mention Tesla who are said to be bringing out a sub £25K EV. It's a big mountain to climb for Jaguar who, in 2022/2023 sold less than 9000 units in North America, once its largest market. There is no good news from other markets, with its world-wide sales at 62,521 units, 20% down on the year before. Jaguar promises that we will, however, see the 2025 new car this year. It will be a four-door GT EV with a second, unspecified model, following later in that year. There will be a third in 2026. The so far unnamed GT will be targeting the Porsche Taycan, so expect pricing to be north of £100K. Said to be the most powerful Jaquar ever with over 600 horses to help it along it has an impressive range of about 400 miles. This is a clear upward movement in the positioning of the Jaguar margue since its attempts to compete in the big

German trio's market segment have failed. Perhaps placing it alongside Porsches and Bentleys may help the brand – but its cars will have to be good first-time.

Once the EV line up has been established, it may be advisable for Jaguar to have a plan for new model roll outs, something sadly lacking in recent times. The last all new Jaguar was the I-Pace back in 2018. This would keep the brand in the public eye and not being slowly forgotten with its only relevance being of an historical nature which will not attract younger or conquest buyers. Good luck, Jaguar.

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
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Hatfield Heath Show
